

Thanks very much to our hardworking Ladies Auxiliary for their contribution towards the upgrades of our kitchen.




Dates for the upcoming Poppy

hour of your time to help with our Tag Days.



Through research, we can better understand the scope and nature of the challenges our Veterans and their families are facing.

The Legion supports research initiatives such as:

Provides an annual \$50,000 Royal Canadian Legion PhD Research
Scholarship through the Canadian Institute for Military and Veteran Health Research (CIMVHR) towards Veterans' research, helping train a future generation of researchers.

Committed \$599,700 over a 3-year period to Heroes in Mind Advocacy and Research Consortium (HiMARC) to support the development and evaluation of early intervention resilience training programs. 

#### **Financial Statement**

August 31st, 2025

Profit & Loss June 1, 2025 to August 31, 2025: Detailed financial statements are available at the Branch, Financial highlights are listed below:

1. Bar revenue for the 3 months ending August 31, 2025 was \$73,579. Other revenues for the year ending August 31, 2025 were Ways & Means net revenue of \$9,226, net Membership Fees of \$629, Bingo/Kitchen rent of \$14,336, Scottish Festival and Regalia net profit of \$12,352, and Other Income of \$12,055. Bar Gross Profit was 58.1% of bar revenue and amounted to \$42,726.

2. Geneva Bingo is held every Wednesday. Trail Walk Catering is open from Friday through Sunday and Holiday for Breakfast in the Vimy room from 8:00a.m. to 11:30am. 3. Building and Administration costs were \$36,189. Wages were \$47,953 so far this year. 4. The Legion's profit for the 3 months ending August 31, 2025 was \$7,182 as compared to a profit of \$2,167 for the 3 months ending August 31, 2024. Balance Sheet - August 31, 2025: 1. Retained earnings at August 31, 2025 were \$99,154. 2. Cash on hand was \$144,809. 3. Accounts payable & reserve liabilities was \$85,600 leaving a net cash balance of \$59,209 at August 31, 2025. 4. The Bingo, Nevada and Raffle bank accounts have a balance of \$27.427.

ONTARIO SENIORS GRANT- The Legion has filed a 2025 Ontario Seniors Grant of approximately \$40,000, for replacement of the Legion's two outside and 2 inside front doors, partial replacement/repair of driveway around the entries to the front of the Legion to make it more accessible, accessible toilets and Seniors programs.

NEW HORIZON GRANT – The Legion is filing a 2025 New Horizon Grant in September, 2025 for \$25,000, to replace the

2 Cooler Thermal Doors, painting outdoor siding & replacement /repair signs.
LEGION KITCHEN - The renovation of the kitchen has been finished with a cost of \$17,650.42 which the Ladies Auxiliary has generously donated \$12,000 to.
PIB/AVIVA INSURANCE -The Orillia Legion's lawsuit for a Business Interruption Claim is on going.

All Chips were plain.


Cubed sugar was regarded as posh.

# **Art that Inspires**

oes art shape us or do we shape art?

We often discover favourite pieces of art based on the emotion it provokes in us. How it connects to something familiar - a friend, a family member or ourselves. A memory of a time or place.

When Barbara Brown started The Steel Spirit - a platform for military, first responder and hospital practitioners to share their artwork and their personal stories - she soon realized that each piece of art on display connected each of the artists involved in the gallery. Many of the stories were parallel in resilience.

"My time in the military was transformative, fundamentally altering how I view the world and engage with its complexities. It equipped me with a unique filter through which to interpret life, allowing me to reflect with greater insight and, in turn, create artwork that tells richer, more profound stories." - LeeAnn LeMesurier.

Many people go into first responder or military services because they want to help others or be in the first line of defence to protect our country. Yet also in these services, they encounter frequent reminders of how fragile life is.

"My first piece [submission to The Steel Spirit gallery], One Zero Eight, is a collection of anonymous sketches of my fellow soldiers' eyes from my tour in 2008. It was hard for me to put myself out there. Yet it is also important to connect with the other artists and realize you are not alone." - Trisha MacLeod.

The Steel Spirit galleries have grown over the last nine years. Initially locally and then with pop up galleries in Nova Scotia and Alberta. These galleries have now connected more than ninety artists across Canada.

"[Art] drives emotion, construction, a meeting point of health, meditation, curiosity, intensity. Fear no judgement, because no one is judging." - Brian Lintner.

Brian has been a contributing member to The Steel Spirit galleries since 2017. Initially he didn't consider himself much of an artist. Now one of his pieces is on permanent display at Base Borden and he has amassed a large collection of artwork that has captured his evolving style.

"Many [of my] pieces have meaning because they meant something to other people. For me, the greatest gift is giving, and seeing people's eyes light up because I make them happy. There is nothing to replicate this emotion. My personal military experience - stay in the background, help others." - Brian.

"Once I met a man who didn't think much of art. He attended one of our gallery receptions out of kindness. To his surprise, one painting in that gallery deeply resonated with him. He spoke about it often after he returned to work. That painting was eventually purchased and gifted to that man at his retirement party." - Barbara.

It's fair to conclude that art definitely shapes us and we shape art as well. Inspiring art creations often reflect a story deep in textures and colours. The more compelling question is...which side of the story do you want to be on?

The Steel Spirit Gallery is currently on display at Barrie City Hall's First Floor Gallery until October 29th.
